

Crown Pointe Academy recognizes that many students are diagnosed with potentially life-threatening allergies. To address this issue and meet state law requirements concerning the management of allergies and anaphylaxis among students, Crown Pointe Academy sets forth the following:

Health Care Plan

The school nurse and school administration shall develop and implement a health care plan for each student diagnosed of a potential life-threatening allergy. The plan shall address communication between the school and emergency medical services, including emergency medical responders. If a student qualifies as a student with a disability in accordance with federal law, the student's Section 504 plan, Individualized Education Plan (IEP) and/or other plan will be developed in accordance with applicable federal law.

Reasonable Accommodations

Reasonable accommodations shall be made within the school to reduce the student's exposure to agents that may cause anaphylaxis. If a student qualifies as a student with a disability in accordance with federal law, the student's Section 504 plan, Individualized Education Plan (IEP) and/or other plan will be developed in accordance with applicable federal law.

Access to Emergency Medications

Emergency medication for treatment of the student's allergies or anaphylaxis shall be kept in a secure location accessible to designated school staff. The student's parent/guardian shall supply the school with the medication needed for treatment of the student's allergies or anaphylaxis in accordance with administration of medications and its corresponding regulation.

Staff Training

Crown Pointe Academy administration, in consultation with the school nurse, shall determine the appropriate recipients of emergency anaphylaxis treatment training. Staff to receive training shall include those staff members directly involved with a student in attendance who has a known allergy. At a minimum, the training shall prepare staff to have a basic understanding of food and other allergies and the importance of reasonable avoidance of agents that may cause anaphylaxis, the ability to recognize symptoms of anaphylaxis, and the ability to respond appropriately when a student suffers an anaphylactic reaction. Training shall include instruction on the administration of self-injectable epinephrine.
