From the Director

One Person Can Change the World (for Better or Worse)

Last Wednesday was a strange day. Strange because it clearly points out how the actions of one person can affect the lives of so many people. Nearly half a million students stayed home because of the threat. The events of the day left me with a question. If we can get that kind of response from something negative, can we get that reaction for positive actions as well? Wednesday goes to show just how one person can change the world, for better or worse. The effect each one of us can have is real, but it doesn't have to be in such dramatic fashion. Little things can change lives too. A smile, a small act of kindness, holding a door open, helping with homework, being a good friend - each add up and make our world a better place.

If you live for 100 years it adds up to 36,500 days or 36,500 opportunities to make a difference. Of those days, one will be your best day and one will be your worst. Sorry, that's just how it works. So, the question isn't about those two outliers. The question is about the other 36,498. How do we carry ourselves on the days in between our best and worse? How do we put forth effort when we are tired, sick, or distracted by life? It isn't easy, but if we conduct ourselves in a manner that makes us a role model (someone who respects themselves and others, someone who digs deep to finish strong when things are tough), then we really are making a difference in a world that can always use a few more positive influences.

At Crown Pointe we are working hard at making a positive difference. Whether it is the little things like opening a car door, celebrating our parent volunteers, or helping a child tie his or her shoe. It can also be the big things like school safety. At CPA we have our exterior doors locked at all hours, a system (Driveline) that controls the release of students back to their parents at the end of the day, and staff training with emergency procedures to ensure everyone's safety. When you put in this kind of effort you never know where it will take you, but we know that one person can change the world.

Junior Achievement at Crown Pointe Academy

For the past seven years, Crown Pointe Academy has partnered with Junior Achievement (JA) to offer the financial literacy program “JA in a Day”. JA’s mission is to prepare young people to thrive in the 21st century workplace and global economy by inspiring a passion in free enterprise and entrepreneurship, and instilling an understanding of personal financial literacy.

Next Monday, May 1st, JA, along with our volunteers from our community partner, Inspirato, will work with students in grades K-5 on a variety of hands-on activities directed towards understanding business in economics. The JA website describes each program as follows:

- **Kindergarten: JA and Ourselves:** JA Ourselves uses storybook characters in read-aloud and hands-on activities to introduce the role people play in an economy. Through engaging, volunteer-led activities, young students learn about individual choices, money, the importance of saving and giving, and the value of work.
- **1st Grade: JA and Our Families:** JA Our Families introduces the concept of needs and wants and explores the ways families plan for and acquire goods and services. Students analyze their own skills to determine ways they can support their families.
- **2nd Grade: JA and Our Community:** JA Our Community uses posters and games to offer practical information about businesses and the many jobs those businesses offer in a community. Students explore production methods through a simulation game, and they learn about taxes, decision making, and how money flows in an economy.
- **3rd Grade: JA and Our City:** JA Our City introduces students to the characteristics of cities and how cities are shaped by zoning. Students also learn about the importance of money to a city, how financial institutions help businesses and city residents, and how the media is an integral part of a city’s life. Students learn the role of an entrepreneur by exploring what it takes to open a restaurant.
- **4th Grade: JA and Our Region:** JA Our Region introduces the relationship between the natural, human and capital resources found in different regions, and explores regional businesses that produce goods and services. Students operate a hypothetical business to understand the fundamental tasks performed by a business owner. The CRED partnership offers students a focus on resources found in the Rocky Mountain region.
- **5th Grade: JA and Our Nation:** JA Our Nation provides students practical information about the need for employees who can meet the demands of the 21st century job market, particularly high-growth, high-demand jobs. Students will understand the skills, especially in STEM, that will make their futures brighter.

As you can see, each year the program builds upon the previous year’s content giving students well-rounded knowledge about how our system of economics operates on a both a small and large scale.

Crown Pointe Academy’s middle school students also continue working with Junior Achievement by completing their personal financial literacy unit in social studies using the JA curriculum. Our 7th graders even take a field trip the Junior Achievement Finance Park at American Furniture Warehouse in Thornton. As part of the program, all students adopt a fictional persona and have to make fiscal decisions based on a pre-determined life circumstance.
