We have a great week of science ahead!

We have begun the process of science fair process. Topic proposals and Research Plans have been uploaded to Google Classroom. This is a great chance to choose a topic/question that will help them to learn at a deeper level something they will learn this year. This is an editing process and may take a few times of them submitting different ideas to get a project approved. Topics will be turned in on Google Classroom so that we can track the editing. Projects need to be approved by September 6th not just turned in by that date.

In addition to science fair, we will begin our first units:

6th Grade: Energy Forms

7th: Atoms and bonds

8th: Genetics– cell parts and DNA review

Tests will be announced one week in advance. It is my recommendation that each student study 10 minutes per day the notes or book work that we did each day.

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Interactive Notebooks For my class, it is really important that your student have a three (3) or (5) subject college ruled, spiral notebook. A single subject spiral notebook **WILL NOT** work for this year. Directions for all pages are up on Google Classroom under Classwork - Interactive Notebooks. If a student is behind they will need to use this resource to get caught up.

Magazines: We need magazines for class. We are looking for any of the following: Time, Sports Illustrated, National Geographic, Better Homes and Gardens, Good Housekeeping, Newsweek, Popular Mechanics, Life, Popular Science, or any other magazine that is more education based. Please have your student bring them to my classroom.

Google Classroom: Students need to make sure they have signed into GC and are able to see all the posts and assignments for each of their classes. If you would like to receive access to the parent notifications on Google Classroom (GC) you need to email me from the email that you would like to receive the information. In your email please state your request and who your student is and I will get you connected.

6th Grade: Unit 2: Civilizations of the Americas: - Chapter: Mesoamerican Civilizations

Students will be working on a packet that will help guide their reading through the chapter and then they will complete an activity to highlight important ideas from the chapter in their Interactive Notebooks (IN). Check updates on Google Classroom for quizzes that may be coming up.

7th Grade: Unit 1: Ancient Southwest Asia and Africa - Chapter: Ancient Egypt and Nubia

Students will be working on a packet that will help guide their reading through the chapter and then they will complete an activity to highlight important ideas from the chapter in their Interactive Notebooks (IN). This will be the basic structure for much of our course work. There will be small assessments along the way and there will be a larger unit test or project at the end of each unit. INs may be used for this assessment as well.

8th Grade: Topic 1: The Early Americas and European Exploration

Students will be working on a packet that will help guide their reading through the chapter and then they will complete an activity to highlight important ideas from the chapter in their Interactive Notebooks (IN). This week in Communications class, we are learning about the 5 Aspects of Great Voice. A quiz on Tuesday or Wednesday in class over the 5 Aspects. 6th and 7th Literature, 8th Writing with Ms. Laxton

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We have a busy week ahead in language arts:

8th grade will continue their review of correct pronoun usage, while also beginning to focus on run-on sentences in their writing.

7th grade will continue to focus on direct and indirect characterization in fiction writing. This week, they will also begin to study different types of text organization.

6th grade will receive their literature terms packet and begin defining several different terms per day in class. This packet will serve as a resource for students throughout the year.

Math with Mrs. Davis and Mr. MacGregor

We would like to make you (and your students) aware of a couple of minor changes to the Math program this year:

- Tests: Just a reminder -- ***the mid-quarter test is on September 6th for all grades.***
- The late work policy has been changed *for daily Math homework only* -- students now have three days past the **DUE DATE** to turn in homework for partial credit. Any work turned in on the fourth day or later beyond the due date will receive zero credit. We cannot stress how vitally important it is for students to keep up on daily work, and the new policy is designed to encourage accountability. Late homework piling up creates a snowball effect. Students begin to feel overwhelmed and the material is not relevant to them after a week. Please note that awarding of credit remains the same (80% one day late; 60% two days late; 40% three days late; 4+ days late = no credit)

6th Grade - We have moved on to **Greatest Common Factor** and **Least Common Multiple**. These two concepts are useful in real-world situations like shopping, design, and economics.

7th grade - This week we continue with **The Number System**. We will wrap up operations with Integers (with multiplication and division), and move into Rational Number operations toward the end of the week.

8th grade - Students had a successful week reviewing 7th-grade concepts and now it's time to move on to the 8th grade curriculum. We begin with **Real Numbers, Exponents, and Scientific Notation**. These are the last building blocks on the way to Algebra.

Community Service Grading

- 2.5 new hours each quarter in addition to the hours required the quarter before
- To receive a 100%, students should have a total of 2.5 hours at the end of 1st quarter, 5 hours at the end of 2nd quarter, 7.5 hours at the end of 3rd quarter, and 10 hours at the May 11th cutoff date for 4th quarter.
- Until the previous quarter's requirements are met no new credit will be given.
- Students will receive 20 points for each **completed** half hour of service in the quarterly requirement. Additional half hours are credited to the following quarter up to the 10 hour requirement. Once the 10 hour requirement is met the student will receive a 100% for that quarter and all following quarters.
- A log (available in Mrs. Hughes' room) must be completed for each month's service and turned in to Mrs. Hughes' room.
- Partial half hours will receive no credit. Hours turned in after the quarterly deadline will be counted toward the total in the next quarter.
- Students cannot receive any compensation for those hours
- Students cannot do the work for the house they live in - exceptions must be arranged through Mrs. Hughes
- Activities like babysitting only count if it is so the parent can complete some kind of service act (serving in a soup kitchen or leading a troop of some kind, etc.) - babysitting for a date night **does not** count
